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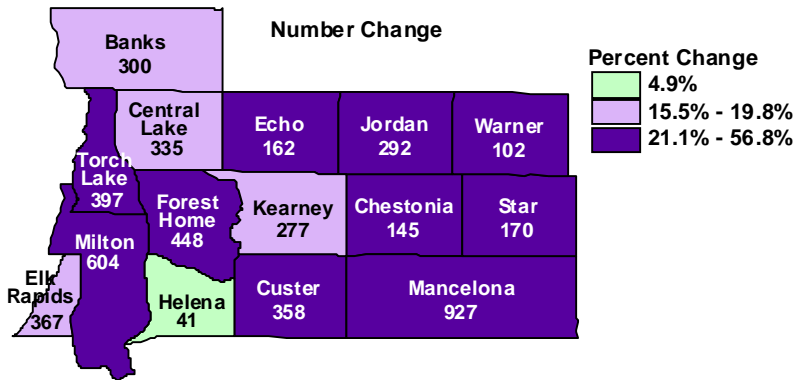
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Population

Antrim County Change from 1990 to 2000

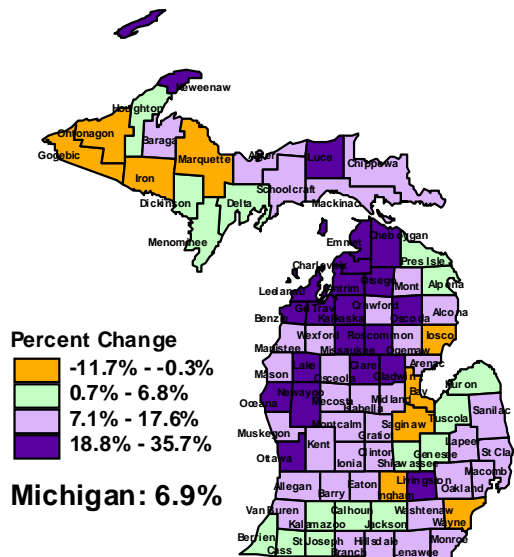


Antrim County had 23,110 people in 2000, ranking as the 62nd most populous county in Michigan. The population increased by 4,925 persons, or 27.1% since 1990.

Custer Township showed the largest percentage gain from 1990 to 2000 at 56.8 percent. Mancelona Township showed the largest number gain of 927 people.

There were 233 live births in Antrim in 1998, of which 31 were to mothers age 19 and under, 182 to mothers age 20 to 34 and 20 to mothers age 35 and over.

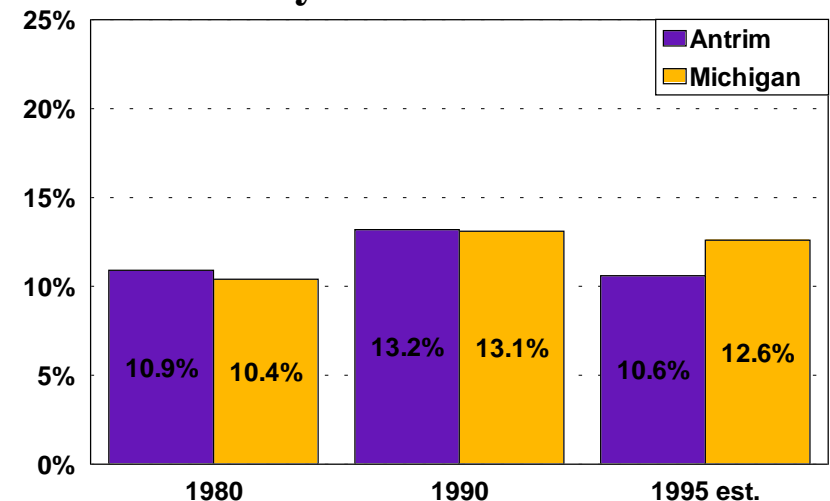
Population change (based on percent change) varied widely across Michigan counties.



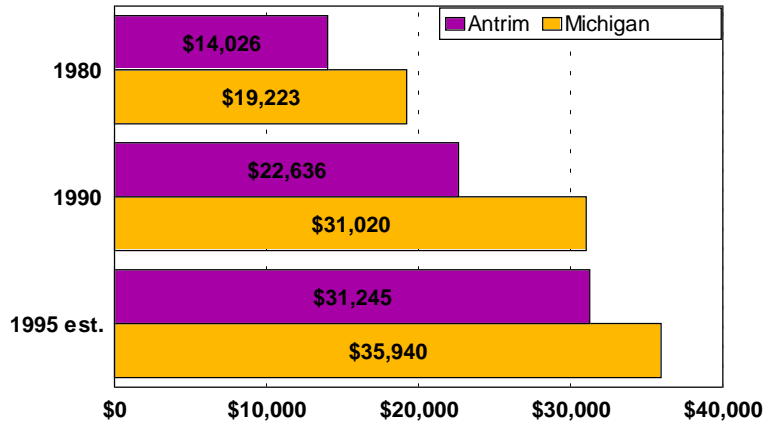
Poverty

- In 1995, 2,197 persons in Antrim County were below the poverty line, decreasing from 2,371 persons in 1990.
- The poverty threshold for a family of four in 1995 was \$15,569. In 1990, it was \$13,360.
- Antrim County ranked 65th among all Michigan counties on the number of persons in poverty in 1995 and 61st on the poverty rate.
- Children represent the highest poverty rate of any age group. 851 kids (ages 0-17) in Antrim County were below the poverty level in 1995. This represents one child in six. In 1990, 864 kids were poor.
- The poverty rate for Seniors (persons age 65 and over) in 1990 was 10.3 percent. This was down from the previous decade when the poverty rate for Seniors was 16.9 percent.

Median Household Income



- Between 1990 and 1995, households in Antrim County experienced an increase in real median income of 18.4 percent, from \$26,394 to \$31,245. Real income is adjusted for inflation based on changes in the Consumer Price Index.
- Compared to other Michigan counties, Antrim County ranked 43rd in 1995 in median household income.
- Michigan leads most other Mid-West states in median household income at \$38,127 (1996 est.) ranking 4th among the 12 states in the region. Nationally, we rank in the top third. The U.S. median income was \$35,492.
- PerCapita income in Antrim County in 1998 was \$22,073, compared to \$18,580 in 1990 (in 1998 dollars), an 18.8 percent increase.

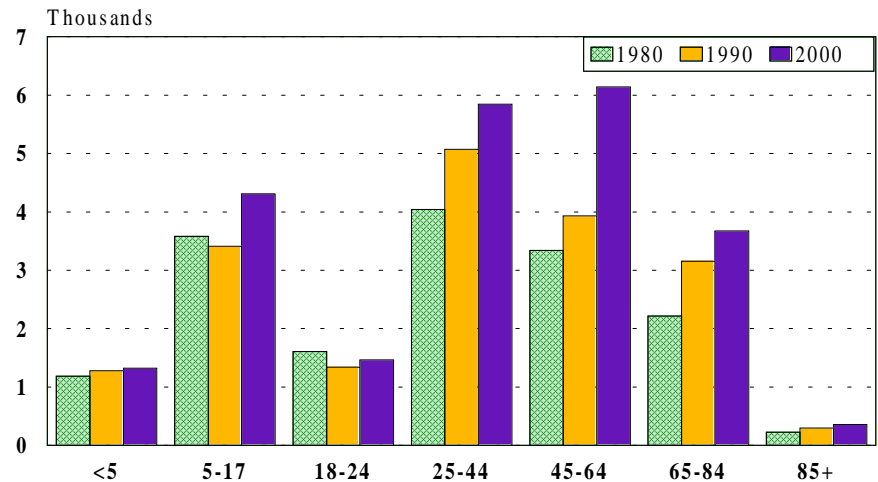

The Median age of Antrim residents continues to go up:

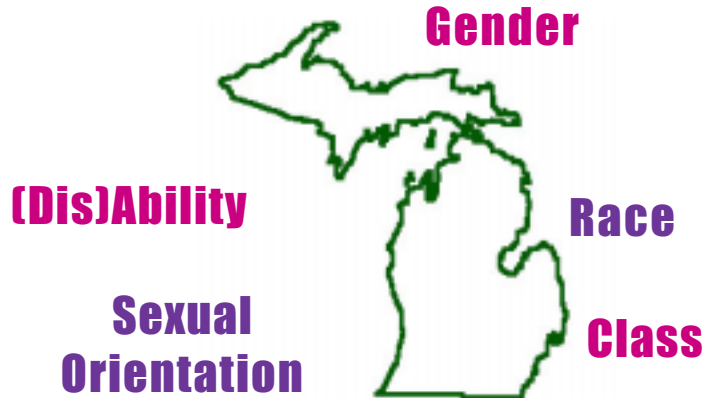

- Of the 23,110 people who lived in Antrim in 2000, 58.2 percent were between 18 and 64 years of age; the remaining 41.8 percent included 5.7 percent children under the age of 5, 18.6 percent youth ages 5 to 17 and 17.5 percent over the age of 65.
- The fastest growing age group is the 45 to 64 year -olds, which includes the oldest of the “baby boomers.” This group grew by 2,208 or 56.2 percent since 1990.
- “Seasoned citizens,” those age 65 and over, grew by 879 or 27.9 percent since 1990. One in six Antrim residents is age 65 or older.

Multiculturalism



- In 2000, Antrim County's population included 11,545 males and 11,565 females, or 50.0 percent and 50.0 percent respectively. For Michigan, males represent 48.7 percent and females 51.3 percent.
- Of the 9,222 households living in Antrim County in 2000, 7,825 or 84.9 percent owned their own home and 1,397 or 15.1 percent rented. For Michigan, the rate of home ownership was 71.0 percent and those renting 29.0 percent.
- Six to ten percent of the U.S. population are gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgendered persons according to the *Cultural Diversity Sourcebook*.
- One out of five Michigan citizens, approximately two million people, experience a disability according to the Michigan Centers for Independent Living.

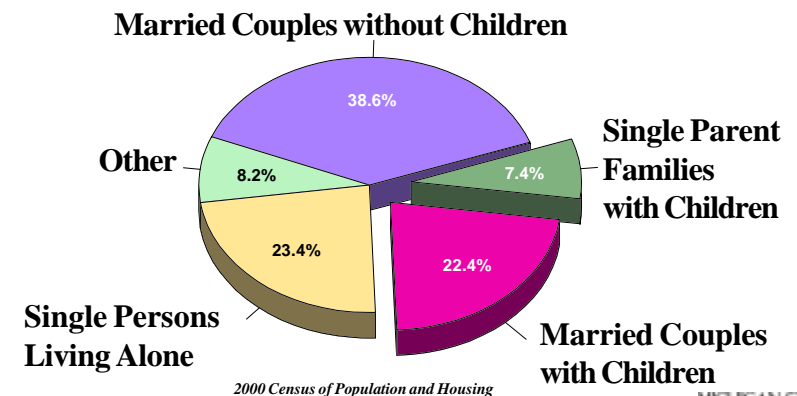

Households & Families

- There were 172 marriages in Antrim County during 1998, up from 1990 when 153 marriages occurred. Across the state, marriage numbers and rates have fallen since the '70s.
- In Michigan, median age at marriage continues to go up, from age 25 for males and 23 for females in the mid-'70s, to age 28 for males and 26 for females in 1998.
- 65.1 percent of all marriages in Michigan in 1998 were first marriages, down from 66.8 percent a decade earlier.
- The divorce rate in Antrim County in 1990 was 8.9 when 81 divorces occurred. In 1998, the rate was 8.2 when 88 marriages ended in divorce.
- In 1998, 37,210 Michigan children were impacted by divorce of their parents. These numbers have declined since 1976 when Michigan reached a peak of 49,555 children involved in divorce.
- In 1990, 800 children in Antrim County under age 18 lived with a single parent. This represented 17.1 percent of all children in Antrim. In Michigan, 22.5 percent of all children lived in single parent families.

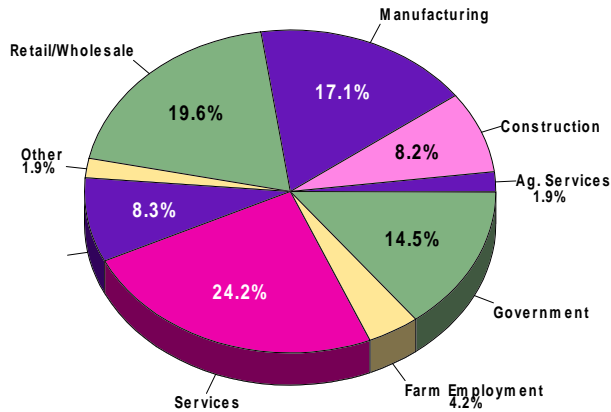
Types of Households in Antrim County



2000 Census of Population and Housing

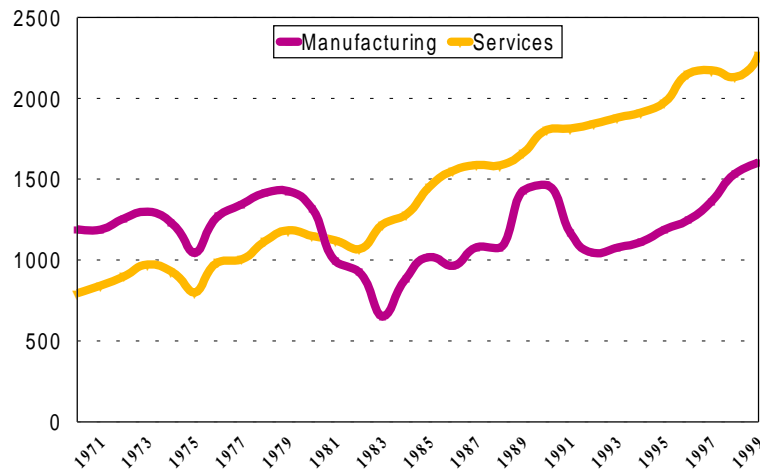
Employment

1999 Employment by Industry in Antrim County



- The total number of full- and part-time jobs has increased in Antrim from 7,246 in 1990 to 9,367 in 1999, a 29.3 percent increase.
- The Services industry accounted for 24.2% of all employment in 1999, leading Retail and Wholesale Trade by 4.6 percentage points. Jobs in Retail and Wholesale Trade have risen the fastest of all industries, climbing 39.9 percent since 1990.

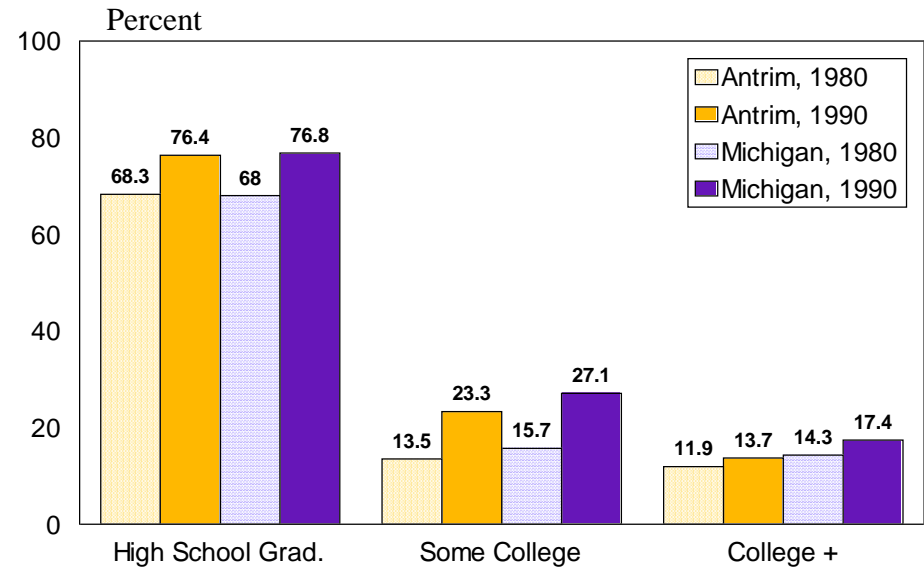
Jobs in Manufacturing & Services



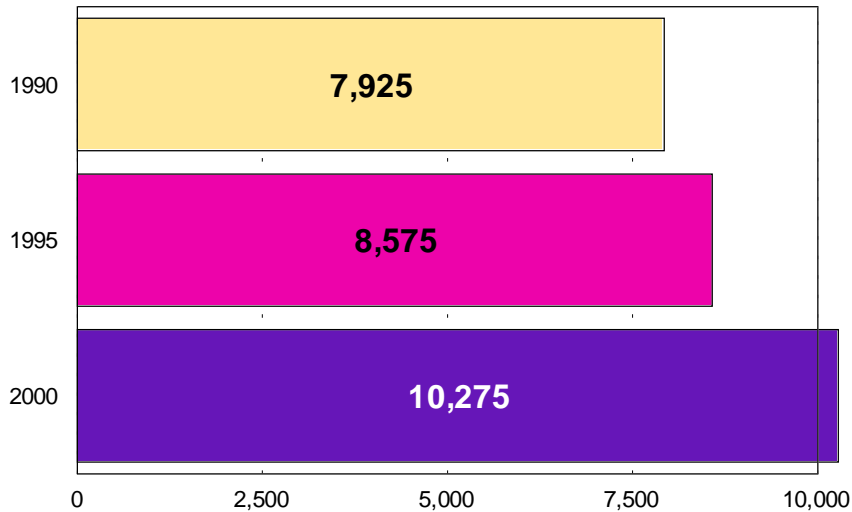
Education

- High school graduation rates increased significantly from 1980 to 1990 for persons age twenty-five and over – by 8.1 percentage points in Antrim County and 8.8 percentage points in Michigan. This is due largely to the fact that a much higher rate of young adults (age 25-29) has completed high school than those in older age groups.
- Antrim County lags behind Michigan for those persons age 25 and over with a college degree. In 1990, 17.4 percent in Michigan had a college degree; in Antrim County the rate was 13.7 percent. Antrim ranks 23rd among Michigan’s 83 counties for persons age 25 and over with a college degree.
- 82 students dropped out of high school in Antrim County during the 1997-98 school year for a rate of 6.3 percent. This is up from 1990-91 when 58 students dropped out (5.3 percent).

Educational Attainment Persons 25 and Over



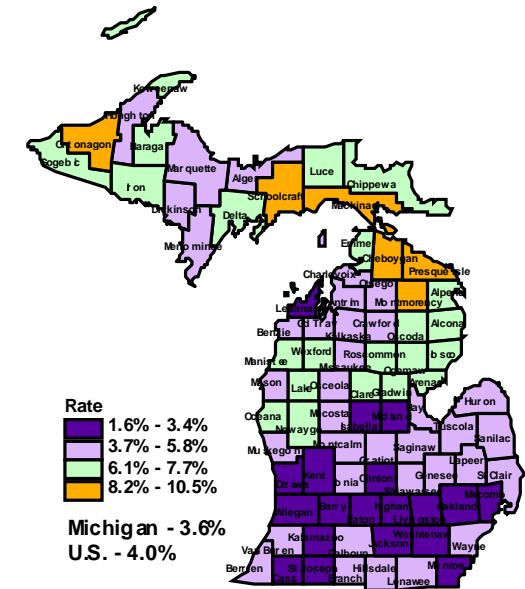
Total Number of Persons Employed in Antrim County



- The Labor Force consists of those who are employed and those currently unemployed but seeking employment. Antrim's labor force has grown from 8,850 in 1990 to 10,875 in 2000.
- In 1990, 89.5 percent of the labor force was employed; in 2000 that increased to 94.5 percent employed.
- 59.9 percent of Antrim's population age 16 and over were in the labor force in 2000, down from 63.1 percent in 1990.
- Seventy-eight percent of all women with school age children worked in 1990, over 14 percentage points higher than in 1980. Six out of ten women with children under age six were in the work force in 1990, compared to four out of ten in 1980.

2000 Unemployment Rate

- Even though Michigan's overall unemployment rate was low in 2000, many counties continue to experience high rates.
- Antrim County's annual average unemployment rate in 2000 was 5.4 percent, compared to 6.4 percent in 1999 and 10.4 percent in 1990. 575 people were unemployed in 2000, compared to 925 in 1990.
- Michigan experienced high unemployment rates during the early '90s. In 1994 for the first time Michigan's rate was lower than the U.S. rate.
