

- Conduct a self-assessment of vulnerabilities and then review it annually, or when the operation changes.
- Maintain shipping manifests, inspection reports, inventories and other records related to food chain security.
- Provide supervision and periodic training to employees to ensure security measures are consistently carried out.
- Monitor security measures to make sure procedures are being followed.
- Conduct background checks on employees to ensure their suitability for assigned tasks.
- Identify procedures for notifying suppliers, customers, and government officials of suspected or confirmed emergencies.
- Address security measures needed during transportation.
- Identify the security requirements of your customers and verify security measures taken by suppliers.
- Limit access to critical operations to authorized employees, contractors, haulers, and visitors.
