Dyslexia and Learning Disabilities

Recently, the National Service Inclusion Project (NSIP) sent the following message to draw attention to a fact sheet on Dyslexia developed by the National Center for Learning Disabilities (NCLD):

What you should know about Dyslexia:

- Dyslexia is a language processing disorder that causes difficulties in reading, writing and spelling.
- Dyslexia can affect different people differently - some can have problems with reading and spelling, while others may find using words correctly and writing or telling left from right challenging.
- According to the National Institute on Child and Human Development, as many as 15 percent of Americans have significant difficulties learning to read.

PLEASE NOTE/Note from Sue Henry: While using a list about any disorder, remember:

- People with any or all of these symptoms may not have a disorder.
- People without appropriate training should never make a diagnosis.
- Not all learning disabilities are caused by dyslexia.

Fact sheets may be useful if you want to plan for success when working with adults or children with learning disabilities. It is helpful to know how to adjust activities to meet various needs and abilities. If you suspect that a person in your program may have a learning disability, please consider that the way that they learn is very different from the person who does not have a learning disability. The person, or in the case of a child, the parent or teacher can often provide helpful information on the ways they learn most easily. Don't hesitate to ask!

County-Specific Data – Claimed and Unclaimed EITC data by county was sent out to each County Extension Director and Regional Director last week through the county mail system. The information was gathered by the Internal Revenue Service and is their best approximation for EITC Claims and Eligible EITC Non-Participants (unclaimed amounts) for tax year 2001. compiling the ES-237, reviewing Member/Leader, Club and Project Code files, the Verification Report, Group Enrollments and Training Log forms, and Year-End Processing procedures. Advanced includes Member Query, Email, Statistical Reports, Achievement Certificates, Membership & ID Cards, Utilities, Packing Tables, and cating historical data files.
